

### News and Views

In this week's Parasha, we are told how Yaakov takes three steps to deal with his brother Esau - he prepares for war, he attempts conciliation, and he prays. Nachmanides tells us that it is these three things which Yaakov did, and which we, as the children of Israel, continue to do.

These three levels of self-preservation represent three different responses - a physical response - the attempt to defend oneself, a mental response - a hope that through negotiation and discussion that Esau will finally accept his brother once more, and a spiritual response - a prayer to G-d.

Yaakov does all three. Yaakov is the father of all the Jewish people, and he gives birth to the 12 tribes, who are literally the children of Israel. Yaakov therefore represents all types of Jews. His response encapsulates different types of Jews and their response to anti-Semitism.



Some Jews would say that the best way to deal with anti-Semitism is with brute force. The idea of sitting down and discussing the problems and solving them is not a solution when such Jews believe that the opposition will never listen. The physical response says that the only strength that exists for the Jews is their physical strength, because they might believe that G-d doesn't exist, or he has forsaken them long ago.

There are other types of Jews. These are the Jews who believe that the western world can be reasoned with, can be negotiated with. There are many Jews in Israel and the diaspora who deal with the western world, who form alliances with them, who create projects in which we can work together with the western world for the betterment of Jews and for the betterment of the world.

There is yet a third type of Jew. This is the one who believes that there is only one answer, and that is in the hands of the Almighty. No gun is going to win this war, no amount of talking with the goyim will sort things out.

There is only one answer, and that is to talk to our Father in Heaven. When Yaakov gives Shchem to his son Josef, he



says that he captured Shchem with "my sword and my arrow", and Rashi immediately comments - this refers to Yaakov's prayers and entreatments of G-d.

So, what is the correct response? What should we do? Yaakov's actions tell us that we need to accept all three, but moreover, that all three are good ideas. We have every right to defend ourselves, but we need to understand that the success of our actions is dependent upon our connection to G-d.
