
News and Views

Poor Joseph. He really has a tough time. His brothers hate him and are so jealous that they even think about killing him, and

eventually sell him into slavery. If this is not bad enough, he is sold by his masters to other slavers, and is eventually brought to Egypt where he is acquired as a slave by Potiphar the steward of Pharaoh.

You would expect Joseph not to be the happiest at this juncture at time. Scorned by his brothers, being shipped from place to place like some sort of acquisition must have had an incredible effect on his self-esteem and mood. You would have expected him to be incredibly depressed and downhearted.

Yet the Torah tells us 'and G-d was with Joseph, and he was successful in the house of Potiphar'. Our sages tell us that G-d is with one **only** when one is in a state of happiness.



Furthermore, how could he have felt that he was successful? Surely after everything that had happened to him, the last thing that he would have felt was that he was successful!

Joseph realised that whatever had happened to him came from G-d. There was a reason for the pain that he had gone through, and he knew that while he didn't know *why* he had gone through so much, that there was purpose in the pain. When there is purpose in life there is the capacity for joy. Depression and sadness strike when we feel a lack of purpose. Life is never easy. There are always challenges, difficulties, worries about work, our children, our livelihoods. However, there is a great joy in knowing two things - 1. that there is ultimate purpose in the things that we do, and 2. that we are not alone - we are never alone, because G-d is with us at every stage of the way.

There is also another really important insight here. Joseph was successful and felt joy because he realised that success is not dependent on what happens to us. No matter his history, no matter what had been thrown at Joseph, they could never take away from him his greatness, his ability to turn threats into opportunities. Joseph was thrown into slavery, but he was able to rise to prominence in the house of Potiphar and experience joy and success because no-one could take away his natural inborn abilities - his charisma, his ability to organise things and to run the affairs of his master was something that could never be taken away from him.

He was Joseph not because of the ways that his brothers mistreated him, or because of the heartache that he suffered - all external events, but because of the gifts which G-d had given him. He was aware of his intrinsic abilities, which could never be taken away, despite the harsh external realities that he faced.

Too often we judge our circumstances based on the ways that others have treated us, or things that happen to us. Joseph transcends all of this. He realises that he suffices, and he suffices because G-d is with him at all times and will never let him down. Such a realisation can only bring joy, even in the darkest of times.
