
# Forthcoming stone-settings

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### **News and Views**

Each year at this time of year, we have the month of Elul, the month which precedes the high holy days The word Elul is an acronym for ANI LEDODI VEDODI LI. I am to my beloved and my beloved is to me. It is a time of special closeness between us and G-d, a moment when we have the opportunity to experience the love affair that exists between G-d and the Jewish people.

To emphasise the extent of this love affair that is going on, we read the psalm 27 right throughout this month and into the high holy days. David says ACHAS SHOALTI ME'EIS HASHEM - there is only one thing that I need in my life, and that is to be in the presence of G-d. If David has this connection to G-d all his



Why do we need such an intense relationship? There is a concept AHAVA MEKALKELET ET HASHURA - love breaks down all the boundaries - it breaks logic. Logic dictates that what we have done during the year should be enough to break down our relationship with G-d. However, there is love involved, G-d can forget our flaws, and is able to focus on our relationship. If there is a committed relationship between partners, both parties are able to forgive flaws in order to maintain focus on the bigger picture which is what they have together.

We see this in practice when the Jewish people sinned by making a golden calf. As great a sin as it was, the



eternality of the relationship between the Almighty and his people is more important than any sin. When there is true sincerity, G-d can see us where we stand now, and not on what we have done in the past. This is potential that lies dormant in these very special days.

We blow the shofar - we are told to wake up from our dreams and recognise that we are in the midst of the most romantic and intimate of relationships. We need G-d, and G-d needs us to spread his ideals and morals through to all of humanity. It is a call to arms, to remember who we are, remind us of the relationship that we have, and the responsibility that it brings to be a light to all the nations.
